

WELCOME to Dirranbandi

Dirranbandi is a small town with a big cotton industry. It is also noted for grazing and dryland farming. Dirranbandi marks the end of the South West rail line and the beginning of the Culgoa Floodplain. Stop for a bite to eat, take a look around, and perhaps stay the night.

The town is situated on the Balonne Minor River and the levee bank is famous for having saved the town from flooding on many occasions. Be sure to turn north at the coloured poles to find Jack Dwyer Memorial Park, a peaceful spot to picnic or, stretch your legs along the walkways and use the exercise equipment. Whilst at the park use the boat ramp or throw in a line to land a Murray Cod or Yellowbelly. On the way there keep an eye out for the scar tree which has particular significance for our indigenous community.

Back in town explore the local shops and uncover the Centennial Walk which features a display of mosaic tiles starting at the Post Office.

On a visit to the Rail & River Precinct you'll find the 1913 Parcel's Office, Goods Shed and the Stationmaster's residence which is home to the Rural Transaction Centre and FB Dirran Hub. Here you will have the opportunity to talk to a local and find out places to camp, birdwatch or get a score card and head out to the local golf club.

Strolling through the precinct you will find an audio board telling the stories of Tom Dancey, the Dirranbandi Dandy and the Charge of Beersheba.

If you are planning to stay the night then Dirranbandi offers a diverse range of accommodation including a caravan park, two motels and a hotel all willing to assist and cater to your needs.
